Also a perk from just being an EAA'r, it was good to hear from Charlie. For those of you who don't know who Charlie is, he works at EAA and came to our chapter a few years back to give us a talk. It was from that talk that I started volunteering on the B25 Berlin Express project. Charlie and I had some small talk, one of which was what did Wittman field look like and how was things around EAA headquarters without AirVenture. Short answer, very different.

The reason Charlie called was my spelling. Those of you who read my articles might notice I miss spell stuff on occasion. You should see what happens when I don't have "spell check"! So to clarify things I miss spelled the name of the airport. It is "Wittman" not "Whitman". Now I knew that, just a brain toot! There was a second reason for his call. He asked have I ever seen Steve Wittman's first airplane project. Yep, I have, seen it many times. It sits in the hangar at Pioneer Airport. Some of us volunteers had started our engine pickling project at EAA a few months back in that very hangar and I had pickled the Wittman "Witt V".





The second tidbit which was part of the reason for his call was did I remember the name of Steve Wittman's first airplane build project. I couldn't recall it until Charlie told me the name. I then remembered part of the name, "Hardly", close to the name of my scooter, the "Hardley". Steve's full name for the first build attempt was "Hardly Abelson". The story goes this way. While still in high school Steve Wittman builds his first airplane. The year was 1923. To power his craft he used a Harley Davidson V twin of 61 cubic inches which swung a 52 inch prop via a chain drive set up. Short story is it was a little under powered and gave him a few hops in a local cow pasture. Not a big success but as we say in the hobby, good experience and a nice "prototype". With the poor resulting performance Steve called the airplane the "Hardly Abelson".
