### June Work Party, Something Different

Bruce and I went up to Oshkosh in late June for another work party although it was not intended to be a B25 work party, and it wasn't.

The Berlin Express was there and has been flying with a total of 7.8 hours on it since completion of the restoration. The report is she fly's great!! They did pull it out of the hangar to check the XM weather hook up. Its flying to Minnesota next week, it's first cross country. Bruce and I plan to go up on the 4<sup>th</sup> and be part of the festivities.



With the Berlin Express done there was plenty of other work to do.

My week centered around some P51's, not a bad substitute. "Paul I" EAA"s P51 needed some paint work so a team of four of us prepared the

blue for painting. This involved taping off the areas, sanding

with 400 grit wet and dry, washing and cleaning the area, covering the rest of the airplane and once painted by EAA personnel we did the clean up. Basically a three day process. Here are some pictures.





The museum also has a XP51, one of North American's early prototypes. It needed some cleaning and detailing. Good project it was in the air conditioned museum!



Another short job was to use a tug to pull a couple of planes over to the show area for the upcoming AirVenture. One was a nice looking Stinson Reliant. Gotta say however the tug has no suspension so you get an "adjustment" on the way, plus it was hot and humid. But I got a nice tour of the show area preparations.





Another team did work on the Berlin Express. They made a canopy cover which the plane really needs if it is going to sit outside, it leaks a little. And rain you say. Oshkosh has been having the same weather as us. Everyone from wherever complained about this years extensive rain fall.



Bruce continued his work on the recently donated T34. They are returning it to flying status. Bruce worked on it all four days and focused on getting the vacuum system refurbished.

### Another Exciting Episode of "NAME THAT PLANE"!

### Airplane #1

- 1. I am a single engine, biplane with a light steel frame.
- 2. My TOP speed was approximately 70mph
- 3. My ceiling was approximately 19,000 ft with my most commonly used 150HP engine
- 4. I was armed initially with a Hotchkiss machine gun, but later had 37MM or 47MM ground Attack guns.
- 5. I could carry up to 600 lbs of bombs in my final variant.
- I had a wingspan of 48', was 31' Long, and weighed in a 2094 lbs empty
- 7. I flew in the air forces for 12 different countries including France, Russia, Britain, Italy, Belgium, United States, and Romania.
- 8. Some would call me the "Baby Stroller in the Sky" or/also "Le Cage de Poulet" ("The Chicken Coop")

#### Airplane #2

- I am a delta wing fighter with a TOP speed of over 1300mph
- 2. My service ceiling is 53,000'
- 3. I was considered the most advanced fighter of my time.
- 4. My development program was cancelled by the government before I went into production. This happened on what was called "Black Friday". This was a highly political decision that is still extensively argued to this day.
- Cancellation of this project put 29,500 people out of work within 2 weeks and was the basis for the eventual demise of the aircraft manufacturer less than 5 years later after 53 years of extremely successful designs and manufacturing.
