As of May 1st, the new medical rules for pilots has now been implemented. EAA and AOPA have all the info on their respective websites.

In essence, the new rules mean you still have to be medically capable of being a pilot, but the Third Class Medical is now optional. A note from your personal physician is now acceptable.
